

### Introduction

The Tribunal's Research Unit prepares bibliographies as a ready reference for anyone wanting to locate readily available, published material about Indigenous Australian people within a particular region or locality. The bibliographies are produced for general library use from reports prepared by the Tribunal for parties to native title mediations. The bibliographies are not exhaustive reference lists about any particular Indigenous group, nor is the published material necessarily an accurate or insightful report of Indigenous society. The Research Unit may update bibliographies from time to time, usually because a new research report has been reproduced for parties to mediation.

It should be noted that the contents and production of these reports are governed by time and resource constraints. They are often prepared in four to eight weeks by a single research officer with some input from a research assistant and Tribunal librarian. Generally most of the references sought for these reports are available only from the AIATSIS library, which in turn has limited resources available to supply material. Therefore care is taken to request only that material which appears relevant to the scope of a particular report.

**Disclaimer**: The bibliographies are a list of materials that have been used by the Research Unit of the Tribunal to provide background information for native title mediations. The Tribunal forms no view on the accuracy, completeness, or relevance of the reference material cited in these bibliographies. Most of this material is held at libraries and is available to the public. The Tribunal library may be able to assist in locating items.

## **Ewamian People Report**

The Ewamian People report was prepared by research staff of the National Native Title Tribunal to assist in the mediation of the Ewamian native title claims in the southern part of the Cape York Peninsula in north west Queensland (Ewamian People QC97/18, Ewamian People #2 QC99/13 and Ewamian People #3 QC01/16). This report was based on publicly and readily available information relevant to the traditional location of the Ewamian people.

#### **Research Method**

The research material used for this report was based largely on a search of the AIATSIS online catalogue, *Mura*, supplemented by relevant references found in Tindale's (1974) *Aboriginal Tribes of Australia*. The following general references were also used:

As the general source material indicated that Wagaman and Ewamin were possibly the same group, a search was undertaken in the 'Language/Group' field of the *Mura* catalogue using the AIATSIS standardised names for these two groups. Only a search of the 'print collection' was undertaken as sound tapes and film sources are difficult to process within the time and resource constraints. The catalogue displayed 10 records for 'Wagaman' and 14 records for 'Ewamin'. 5 items were subject to access restrictions and 1 item was a tape incorrectly indexed in the catalogue as a book. These were unavailable for use.

A search was also made of the Environment Australia online library catalogue<sup>1</sup> and the HERA catalogue<sup>2</sup> of heritage survey research reports and other relevant material. The aim of the search was to identify additional relevant materials that may not be held by AIATSIS. These catalogues are less likely than the AIATSIS catalogue to refer specifically to a language identified group, using instead general categories (e.g. Aboriginal) and geographic areas. Therefore, a list of place names within and adjacent to the claim application areas was compiled and a search was conducted in the 'General Keyword' category of the Environment Australia catalogue and the 'Location Keyword' category of the HERA catalogue.

The Environment Australia (EA) search yielded 663 records and the HERA search yielded 33 records. The abstracts for each record were examined to determine their likely relevance or usefulness. Those materials that referred to histories of the area, to archaeology, to Aboriginal people or to Aboriginal sites were ordered. The omitted materials include obvious duplications, those that refer to areas outside of Queensland and surveys within Queensland that did not seem include the above details.
