

Annexure 2 – DESCRIPTION OF THE MALGANA AGREEMENT AREA

Malgana and Talisker Station ILUA

External boundary description

The agreement area covers all the land and waters within the external boundary described as:
That part of Talisker Pastoral Lease (N049949) that falls wholly within Native Title Determination WAD6236/1998 Malgana (WCD2018/012), further described as:

That part of Talisker Pastoral Lease (N049949) that falls westerly and northerly of a line extending generally southerly through the following coordinate points.

Then south westerly to the westernmost north western corner of Lot 214 as shown on Deposited Plan 220375, also being an eastern corner of Talisker Pastoral Lease (N049949); then southerly along an eastern boundary of that pastoral lease to Latitude 26.598612° South, then generally westerly to a point at Longitude 114.031482° East , Latitude 26.630981° South.

Excluding that area identified in Schedule Four of Native Title Determination WAD6236/1998 Malgana (WCD2018/012) as areas where Native Title Does Not Exist, being: Historical Road 23 - Portion of Road No. 7095 Easement 10 - E180193 (3134B/214) Easement 13 - D819193 (3134B/110)
