

Schedule 1 ILUA Area

The ILUA Area is all of the land and waters within that part of Lot 18 on Plan NPW936 (Girringun National Park) that is within Native Title Determination Application QUD111/04 Warrungu People 2 QC04/8 (as accepted for registration 22nd April 2005), further described as;

Commencing on the northern boundary of Lot 3 on Plan WU32 at Longitude 145.672729° East, also being a point on the western boundary of former Lot 750 on Plan AP6351 and extending north westerly along the western boundary of that former lot to Latitude 18.408324° South; then generally south easterly through the following coordinate points;

Then south easterly to again the northern boundary of Lot 3 on Plan WU32 at Longitude 145.680249° East; then generally westerly along the northern boundary of that lot back to the commencement point.

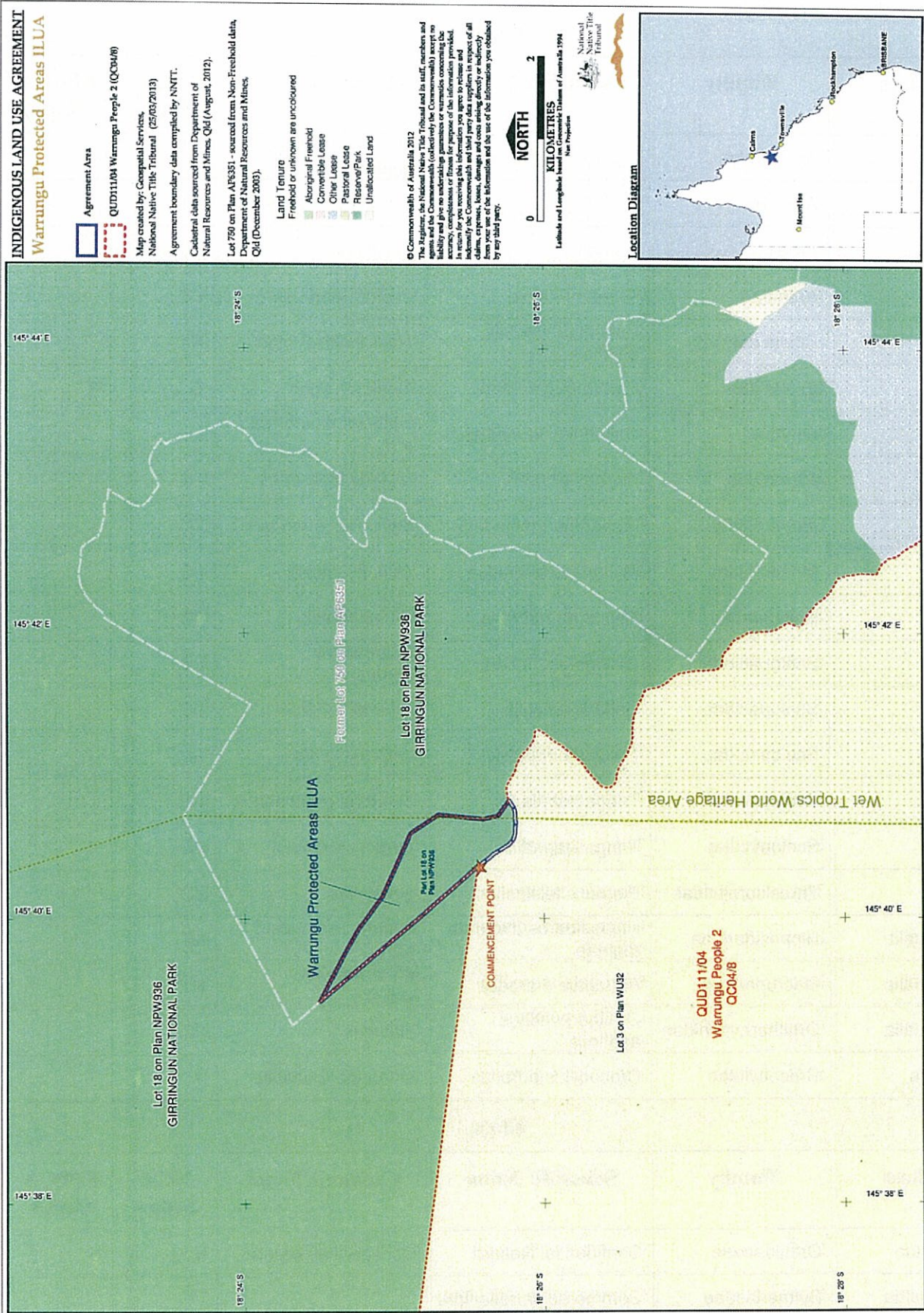
Reference Datum
