### Description

The agreement area covers all the land and waters subject to -  
That portion of Napier Downs Pastoral Lease (N049855 and N049720) that falls within Native Title Determination WAD94/2012 Bunuba People #2 Part A (WCD2015/009), further described as:

That part of Napier Downs Pastoral Lease (N049855 and N049720) south east of a line commencing at the northernmost corner of the northernmost western severance of Lot 342 as shown on Deposited Plan 52596; then generally southerly along the western boundaries of that severance to Latitude 17.276383 South, then extending generally south westerly, generally westerly and generally southerly passing through the following coordinate points:
